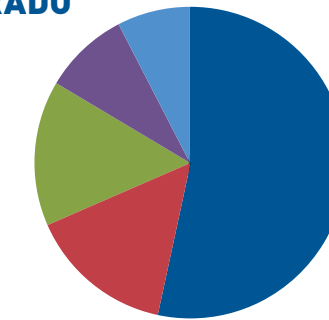

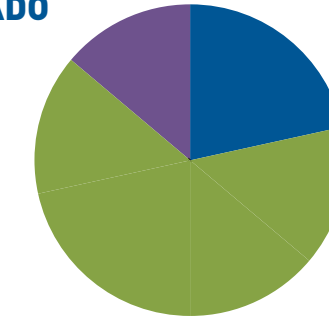

Celebrating Our Many Victories for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties in Colorado

The ACLU of Colorado fiscal year runs from April 1 to March 31. It was an historic year, with major victories for LGBT rights, immigration, prison reform, the rights of people living in poverty, and defense of the First Amendment. Here is a timeline of some of our biggest moments:

2014



MAY 2014

The ACLU of Colorado successfully argued before the Colorado Civil Rights Commission that Masterpiece Cakeshop violated Colorado's anti-discrimination laws by refusing to make a wedding cake for Charlie Craig and David Mullins.

JUNE 2014

The ACLU of Colorado won a \$30,000 settlement for Claudia Valdez, a domestic violence victim who was wrongly jailed for three days on a federal immigration "hold" after a judge had ordered her release.

JUNE 2014

Governor Hickenlooper signed two new ACLU-backed laws banning the use of long-term solitary confinement for prisoners with serious mental illnesses and ending the practice of putting people in jail because they are too poor to pay fines and court fees. Both were passed by overwhelming bipartisan majorities.



JULY 2014

As part of the Why Marriage Matters campaign, the ACLU of Colorado delivered 5,000 petition signatures to Attorney General John Suthers urging him to stop defending Colorado's unconstitutional same-sex marriage ban.



AUGUST 2014

Through legal action and advocacy, the ACLU convinced all sheriffs in the state to stop holding people in jail based on detainer requests from federal immigration authorities.

SEPTEMBER 2014

ACLU of Colorado publicly supported Jefferson County student protesters who objected to censorship of their AP History curriculum.



OCTOBER 7, 2014

After years of struggle and advocacy, Colorado achieved full marriage equality.

OCTOBER 2014

At the 2014 Carle Whitehead Bill of Rights Dinner, the ACLU of Colorado recognized the late Dr. Vincent Harding, Laura Rovner, and Bob Connelly.

NOVEMBER 2014

The ACLU of Colorado helped defeat Amendment 67, a deceptive and far-reaching "personhood" ballot initiative.



DECEMBER 2014

ACLU lawyers went before the Colorado Supreme Court to argue that a Douglas County school voucher program illegally funneled taxpayer money to private religious schools.

DECEMBER 2014

The ACLU of Colorado negotiated a \$340,000 settlement with the City of Denver to compensate three mistaken ID arrest victims.

2015

JANUARY 2015

The ACLU filed a lawsuit against the City of Trinidad on behalf of Danika Gonzalez, a probation officer who lost her job and had her reputation destroyed after she was falsely arrested in a highly-publicized drug sting that was based on unsubstantiated accusations from a dishonest criminal informant.



FEBRUARY 2015

Youth Rising! At our 2015 Annual Meeting, we honored the students and young people who made 2014 an historic year of youth activism in Colorado.

MARCH 2015

The City of Fort Collins repealed its unconstitutional panhandling ordinance following a class action lawsuit from the ACLU of Colorado. In 2014 and 2015, the ACLU successfully defeated unconstitutional restrictions on panhandling in about a dozen Colorado cities. We've also successfully advocated against "sit-lie" ordinances and other measures that criminalize the existence of people who are homeless.



MARCH 2015

The ACLU legislative team fought off several attacks on civil liberties during the 2015 legislative session, including more than a dozen attempts to restrict reproductive rights, and two "Right-to-Discriminate" bills that would have allowed businesses and individuals to claim religious exemptions to Colorado laws.



APRIL 2015

The ACLU of Colorado helped pass a wide-ranging set of new police accountability bills intended to repair community trust in law enforcement. The legislature gave bipartisan approval to several new bills on issues ranging from racial profiling to body-worn cameras to the right to record police.

APRIL 2015

The ACLU of Colorado joined Denver Homeless Out Loud in support of the Right-to-Rest Act, a bill to combat criminalization of homelessness. The bill was ultimately defeated in the 2015 session, but it will be one of our top priorities in 2016.

MAY 2015

The ACLU announced that it will represent Ryan and Benjamin Brown, two African-American men who were victimized by racially-biased policing in Colorado Springs. Ryan's video recording of a traffic stop in which he and his brother were pulled from their vehicle, searched, handcuffed, and detained over a cracked windshield, went viral and drew national headlines.
